The Impact of DEI and SDOH on Health Care Delivery Saturday, October 7 | 7:45-9:15 a.m. ET

David Baron, DO, MEd is the Chair of the Section on Psychiatry, Medicine and Primary Care for the World Psychiatric Association. He is also Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the Center for Mental Health and Sports at the Western University of Health Sciences, College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific-Northwest Western. Dr. Baron joined the university in May 2018 after serving eight years in roles within the Department of Psychiatry at the Keck School of Medicine, including Vice Dean for Global Health, Professor of Psychiatry and Neurosurgery, Vice Chair of the Department, and Chief of Service at Keck-USC Hospital.

He received his DO degree from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine (PCOM) and a Master of Science in Education from the University of Southern California (USC). He is the former Deputy Clinical Director of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), former President of the American College of Neuropsychiatry and the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, and chaired the Department of Psychiatry at Temple University School of Medicine from 1998-2010.

Dr. Baron was named a National Fulbright scholar in 2017-18 and conducted his research as Distinguished Chair in Brain Research at the University of Calgary. He also is the recipient of a Fulbright Specialist Award.

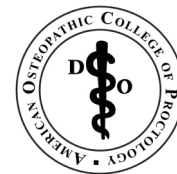

Program Descriptions

Addiction Medicine

The **American Osteopathic Academy of Addiction Medicine (AOAAM)** is offering 16 hours of CME at OMED 2023. Twelve hours will meet the new one-time, eight-hour training requirement for all **Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)-registered practitioners on the treatment and management of patients with opioid or other substance use disorders (Each session title is noted with an asterisk *)**. Educational sessions will inform the practicing osteopathic physician on improving clinicians' ability to treat specialized health populations, thoughtful examination of the newest trends in treatment of patients with substance use disorder, and recent legislative changes in the field. The AOAAM will provide this content virtually. (DEA hours noted with an asterisk (*).)

Allergy and Immunology

The **American Osteopathic College of Allergy and Immunology (AOCAI)** has developed sessions that will introduce attendees to venom hypersensitivity - its causes, symptomatology, and treatment - as well as triggers and treatments for atopic dermatitis, including biologics. Asthma and new guidelines and biologic treatments will also be presented. New insights will include the introduction of primary immunodeficiencies and genetic testing and a demonstration of Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine's (OMM) use in rhinitis. Both primary care physicians and specialists will benefit from these sessions.

Anesthesiology

The **American Osteopathic College of Anesthesiologists (AOCA)** will address the medical skills necessary for anesthesia practice. Participants can align their practice goals to stay current with medical education and improve patient outcomes. Sessions will cover perioperative management of patients, facilitating and navigating mental health issues in the perioperative period, ICU management, critical care during a crisis, and physician health and well-being.

Dermatology

The **American Osteopathic College of Dermatology (AOCD)** will provide a diversified CME program focusing on the art and science of dermatology. Educational lectures will include topics ranging from Mohs micrographic surgery, updates in pediatric dermatology, practice management, atopic dermatitis update, pruritus, skin color, and other timely and relevant topics.

Emergency Medicine

The **American College of Osteopathic Emergency Physicians (ACOEP)** will cover emergency medicine in various settings, including the family medicine office, urgent care, and emergency departments. The information presented, developed by ACOEP, will be valuable to physicians in both community and academic settings. Though comprehensive in scope, the lecture format will be abbreviated presentations by speakers of various related and complementary specialties.

Family Medicine

The **American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFF)** will provide educational sessions across a variety of innovative topics, including menopause and mental health, obesity, nutrition, GI issues, and more. ACOFF also partners with their sister societies to provide interdisciplinary education across disciplines.

Program Descriptions

Hematology

The **American Society of Hematology (ASH)** will provide robust, current educational content, including understanding chronic leukemias, CAR T-cell therapy, sickle cell disease, abnormal newborn screens, overview of peripheral blood and bone marrow assessment, easy bleeding and bruising, palliative care approaches, diagnosing and managing acute thrombocytopenia, CLL, cell therapy, common CBC abnormalities, the pathway to cure multiple myeloma, and pediatric sickle cell care for the general physician. This wide range of current, high-interest topics for all osteopathic physicians and medical students will help inform clinical practices, increase awareness, and educate patients.

Internal Medicine

The **American College of Osteopathic Internists (ACOI)** will have sessions on cardiology, palliative care, geriatric medicine, pulmonary medicine, endocrinology, hospital and office medicine, and gastroenterology. Educational sessions will include improving physicians' ability to treat and diagnose GI disorders, learning how oxygen therapy in lung disease may help, discussing how to deal with difficult end-of-life issues, and more. ACOI is very excited to be able to provide virtual internal medicine CME during OMED23!

Neurology/Psychiatry

Educational sessions presented by the **American College of Osteopathic Neurologists and Psychiatrists (ACONP)** will cover a broad range of exciting topics in the field such as OMM in neurology, migraines, TMJ and cervicogenic OMM treatment, the nervous system and commonly used drugs in medical disorders, opioids in patient treatment, subdural hematoma treatment options, postural orthostatic tachycardia syndrome (POTS), and more.

Obstetrics/Gynecology

The **American College of Osteopathic Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOOG)** will address common and uncommon health issues unique to women and physicians from multiple specialties providing women's healthcare. Educational sessions will include topics such as peripartum mental health, overactive bladder syndrome, contraception in complex patients, OMT for abdominal and pelvic pain, endometriosis, nutrition, substance use, hormone replacement therapy, integrative therapy for UTI and vaginitis, and more. Participants will gain a comprehensive insight into relevant medical problems and a fundamental approach to addressing and improving common health concerns.

Occupational and Preventive Medicine

The **American Osteopathic College of Occupational and Preventive Medicine (AOCOPM)** will address some of the most pressing public health issues the nation is facing today. Topics will be divided into three divisions: Public Health and General Preventive Medicine, occupational medicine, and aerospace medicine.

Program Descriptions

Ophthalmology

Educational sessions will include an in-depth overview of thyroid eye disease and methods for early detection and intervention, leading to better outcomes and minimizing the risk of vision loss. The program will also explore how to recognize the signs and symptoms of angle-closure glaucoma and review its management methods. In addition, this educational content developed by the **American Osteopathic College of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery (AOCOO-HNS)**, will cover Endothelial Keratoplasty in Fuchs Endothelial Corneal Dystrophy. There will also be information regarding federal policy and the AOBBOO-HNS (American Osteopathic Board of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery) board certification.

Orthopedics

The **American Osteopathic Academy of Orthopedics (AOAO)** will address musculoskeletal issues commonly encountered by primary care physicians, general surgeons, and orthopedic surgeons. In addition, educational sessions will cover topics such as pediatric orthopedics, women's health, sports medicine, and common foot and ankle conditions.

Osteopathy

The **American Academy of Osteopathy (AAO)** will showcase distinguished faculty presenting the Still Technique, the force vector, acupressure with classic techniques, muscle energy, cranial, counterstrain, Chapman points, dental considerations, lymph with BLT, and visceral with Chapman points. This engaging program will provide attendees with comprehensive and state-of-the-art information about how osteopathic physicians can treat these regions of the body.

Otolaryngology

Program Descriptions

Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation

The **American Osteopathic College of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation's (AOCPMR)** program will focus on optimizing physiatry and physical medicine and rehabilitation in today's healthcare environment. Educational session topics will include stroke care, anti-doping, tendonopathy, fMRI scans, TBI/concussion, an in-depth look at SIJ, and inpatient care, among other topics.

Proctology

The **American Osteopathic College of Proctology (AOCPr)** lectures will cover topics including common anorectal disorders, perianal dermatology, and advanced hemorrhoid treatments and procedures. Despite the prevalence of proctology-related concerns, these topics are not addressed enough due to their sensitive nature. From the basics of hemorrhoids and fistulas to specific case studies on rare diseases, this track aims to provide participants with insight on the current and upcoming diagnosis/treatment protocols in the field of proctology.

Prolotherapy

The **American Osteopathic Association of Prolotherapy Regenerative Medicine (AOAPRM)** program starts with the basic skills required to perform a prolotherapy treatment as well as the specifics of hip and knee treatments. Platelet-rich plasma (PRP) is discussed as an advanced prolotherapy treatment for cases that are more complicated will also be addressed. along with the latest treatment modalities for the lumbar spine, advanced cervical/thoracic region, elbow, wrist, and hand. The educational session will conclude with the practical clinical assessments required before performing any prolotherapy treatments.

Radiology

The **American Osteopathic College of Radiology (AOCR)** will provide educational content across high-interest topics of interest to the general radiologist. In addition, this program will facilitate interdisciplinary collaboration with other medical specialties.

Sports Medicine

The **American Osteopathic Academy of Sports Medicine (AOASM)** will present topics that are pertinent to doctors of all specialties. With regard to pediatric, adolescent, adult, and disabled athlete populations, educational sessions will offer a thorough review of common musculoskeletal conditions, including diagnostic evaluation, management, and return-to-play considerations. Content related to how a healthy diet and other factors pertaining to the active patient population can improve recovery time will also be highlighted.

A native of East Lansing, Michigan; she pursued her residency training at St. John/Detroit Riverview Hospitals.

Dr. Cannon continues her mission of public service and health education via leadership roles on local and national levels. She is the 2018-19 President of the American College of Osteopathic Obstetricians and Gynecologists and the first African-American to hold that office in its 84-year history. Reframing Rescue Therapy to Help Prevent Asthma Exacerbations

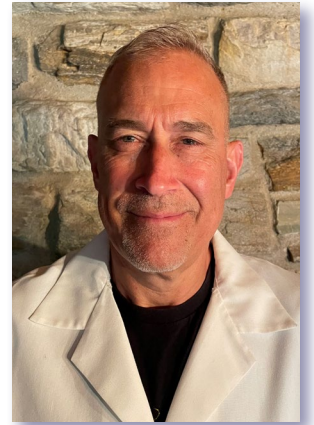

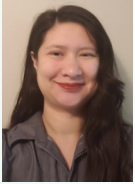
