Keynote – Featuring J.D. Polk, DO Friday, September 20 | 7:45 a.m. CT

J.D. Polk, DO, is the agency Chief Health and Medical Officer of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), based in Washington, D.C. He assumed this position in November 2016, bringing with him a wealth of experience in the fields of emergency medicine, disaster medicine, space medicine, and medical management.

Prior to his current role at NASA, Dr. Polk held several high-profile positions, including serving as the Dean of Medicine for Des Moines University's College of Osteopathic Medicine, the Assistant Secretary (Acting) for Health Affairs and Chief Medical Officer of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and the Chief of Space Medicine for NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas.

Throughout his career, Dr. Polk has demonstrated a strong commitment to public service, serving on the boards of organizations such as the Red Cross of Greater Iowa, ChildServe of Iowa, and the American Association for Physician Leadership. He is also a Fellow of several prestigious medical associations, including the American College of Osteopathic Emergency Physicians, the Aerospace Medicine Association, and the American Association for Extreme and Wilderness Medicine.

Highly credentialed, Dr. Polk holds a degree in Osteopathic Medicine from A.T. Still University, as well as multiple master's degrees in Space Studies, Medical Management, and Public Health. He is triple board certified in emergency medicine and aerospace medicine and has been widely recognized for his contributions to the field, receiving numerous awards and commendations from various organizations, including NASA, the Federal Bureau of Investigations, and the U.S. Air Force.



Keynote – Featuring Tamika Catchings Friday, September 20 | 8:30 a.m. CT

Tamika Catchings is a retired professional basketball player who played for the Indiana Fever throughout her entire 15-year Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) career. In 2012, Ms. Catchings won the WNBA championship and was awarded the WNBA Most Valuable Player Award in 2011. In addition to countless other awards and accolades, she received four Olympic gold medals. In 2011, Ms. Catchings was voted as one of the WNBA's Top 15 Players of All Time by fans and was later named in two more top lists in 2020 and 2021.

From 2012 to 2016, Ms. Catchings served as the president of the WNBA Players Association. She was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2020. In 2004, she founded a charitable organization called the Catch the Stars Foundation that provides basketball camps, fitness clinics, mentoring, and literacy programs for underprivileged children. In 2008, Ms. Catchings was awarded the Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award in recognition of her efforts with the Catch the Stars Foundation and her work throughout the Indianapolis community.

Keynote – Featuring Kevin O'Connor, DO Saturday, September 21 | 4 p.m. CT

Kevin O'Connor, DO, is a decorated military physician who served in the U.S. Army for over 20 years. During his military service, Dr. O'Connor received the Combat Medic Badge. He has also dedicated 15 years to caring for the nation's chief leaders as a key member of the White House Medical Unit, serving under multiple administrations. Dr. O'Connor first served as a physician in the White House during the George W. Bush administration for 3 years, later becoming then-Vice President Joe Biden's physician and, subsequently, in 2021, Physician to the President.

In 2013, he was inducted into the Order of Military Medical Unit. He is currently on the faculty at George Washington University, serving as an associate professor of health, human function, and rehabilitation services. In 2020, Dr. O'Connor was appointed as the medical director of St. Bonaventure University's Franciscan Health Care profession program. In 2017, Dr. O'Connor collaborated on and contributed to the creation of a health care program for veterans. Most recently, Dr. O'Connor received a presidential citation, awarded to him at the AOA's annual House of Delegate meeting.



Keynote – Featuring Montel Williams Saturday, September 21 | 4:30 p.m CT

Montel Williams is a multifaceted individual who has overcome remarkable personal challenges and leveraged his experiences to become a celebrated media personality, a decorated former marine and naval officer, and a dedicated advocate for health, veterans, and various social causes.

Despite battling Multiple Sclerosis for over 25 years and recovering from a stroke, Mr. Williams has demonstrated remarkable resilience and perseverance. His extensive work as a health advocate has significantly influenced public discussions on healthcare, making him an influential voice in the health sector.

Mr. Williams's military accolades, including two Meritorious Service Medals, two Navy Commendation Medals, and two Navy Achievement Medals, along with his academic achievements, such as a degree in General Engineering from the prestigious Naval Academy and additional qualifications in Russian and Mandarin, have provided him with a unique perspective on problem-solving and leadership during times of adversity.

Beyond his media career, Mr. Williams is a best-selling author, an Emmy Award-winning television host, and a successful actor. He also hosts two compelling podcasts that delve into topics ranging from cannabis to societal issues, health, and wellness. Notably, Mr. Williams's philanthropic efforts, which include supporting organizations focused on veterans' welfare, diversity, children's well-being, and animal rights, further exemplify his deep-rooted passion for making a positive impact on various communities.

Addiction Medicine

The American Osteopathic Academy of Addiction Medicine (AOAAM) is offering 15 hours of CME at OMED 2024. Sessions that meet the training requirement for all DEA-registered practitioners on the treatment and management of patients with opioid or other substance use disorders are noted with an asterisk (*). Educational sessions will inform practicing osteopathic physicians about improving clinicians' ability to treat substance use disorders in specialized health populations such as adolescents, pregnant women, healthcare professionals, and palliative care populations. There will be a particular focus on addiction in the rural population and consideration of how to increase access to care through novel caredelivery models such as mobile treatments and group-based virtual MOUD delivery as well as training resident physicians to practice addiction medicine in the rural context. In addition, special topics related to current practice will include navigating challenges related to the dramatic rise of methamphetamine, fentanyl, cannabis, designer drugs, and gambling in our populations.

Allergy and Immunology

The American Osteopathic College of Allergy and Immunology (AOCAI) will present lectures covering topics on gene therapy, asthma, allergic rhinitis, and current recommendations on vaccinations. These presentations will explore the present use and future use of therapeutic options for genetic intervention; the mechanism of pesticide exposure that may trigger asthma attacks, exacerbate asthma, or increase the risk of developing asthma; the importance of the interaction of early exposure to microbes and the induction of immune tolerance; the different endotypes of rhinitis; and updates on the current recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Vaccination Practices (ACIP) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

Family Medicine

The American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) offers a diverse range of educational sessions covering innovative topics in Family Medicine. As Family Medicine plays a crucial role in healthcare, ACOFP ensures that its members are equipped with the latest knowledge and skills in the field. In collaboration with sister societies, ACOFP also provides interdisciplinary education, allowing healthcare professionals to learn from and collaborate with colleagues from different disciplines. With a focus on comprehensive and holistic healthcare, ACOFP is dedicated to advancing the practice of Family Medicine and promoting excellence in patient care.

Military

The Association of Military Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons (AMOPS) has developed sessions that will introduce attendees to Military Medicine: on Land, Sea, and Air, as well as Military Medicine: Front Lines to Civilian Trauma Centers! Sessions include aerospace medicine, medical support to the warfighter, integrating military medicine in the civilian world, burn care, TBI, FAST exams, and a demonstration of Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine's (OMM) use on the battlefield, shipboard, and flightlines. Both military physicians and civilian physicians will benefit from these sessions.

Neurology/Psychiatry

The American College of Osteopathic Neurologists and Psychiatrists (ACONP) educational sessions will cover a range of topics in the field such as headaches in pregnancy, happiness and resilience, cannabis use in psychiatric care, myasthenia gravis update, post-traumatic stress disorder, Prevent 2 Protect, Safe and Sound Schools, and much more.

Occupational and Preventive Medicine

The American Osteopathic College of Occupational and Preventive Medicine (AOCOPM) will address current occupational, environmental, and preventive medicine topics. Topics will be divided into three divisions: public health and general preventive medicine, occupational medicine, and aerospace medicine. Focus areas within these divisions include correctional medicine, undersea hyperbaric medicine, and disability impairment medicine.

Osteopathy

The **American Academy of Osteopathy (AAO)** will showcase distinguished faculty discussing the concepts of motion and stillness in osteopathic medicine. This will include special emphasis on lymphatics, gait issues, hypermobility, tremor, spasticity, concussion, and OMT on the sidelines. This engaging program will provide attendees with comprehensive and state-of-the-art information about how physicians can diagnose and treat these and other conditions in a comprehensive manner including utilization of a wide variety of OMT approaches.

Pediatrics

The American College of Osteopathic Pediatricians (ACOP) plans to address current topics related to the care of children, including sessions on neonatal/perinatal medicine, adolescent medicine, pediatric infectious disease, immigrant health, pediatric hot topics, practical pediatrics, orthopedics, and OMM/ OMT. In addition to the clinical topics, ACOP is also organizing a session to discuss the decline in students entering pediatric residencies and how to address the shortage.

Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation

The American Osteopathic College of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (AOCPMR) program will focus on optimizing physiatry and physical medicine and rehabilitation in today's healthcare environment. Educational session topics will include stroke care, anti-doping, tendinopathy, fMRI scans, TBI/concussion, an in-depth look at SIJ, and inpatient care, among other topics.

Prolotherapy

The American Osteopathic Association of Prolotherapy Regenerative Medicine (AOAPRM) program starts with the basic skills required to perform a prolotherapy treatment. Platelet-rich plasma (PRP) is discussed as an advanced prolotherapy treatment for cases that are more complicated. The latest treatment modalities for the cervical, lumbar, and thoracic spine will be covered. Each day, the didactic sessions will conclude with practical clinical assessments.

Sports Medicine

The American Osteopathic Academy of Sports Medicine (AOASM) will present "Sports Medicine: A Pathway to Whole Body Wellness." The program includes sports medicine topics relevant to physicians in all specialties. We will provide an in-depth review of common musculoskeletal conditions including diagnostic evaluation, management, and return-to-play considerations across pediatric, adolescent, adult, geriatric, and disabled athlete populations. The program will also explore concepts of wellness and fostering health, in addition to interventional management and rehabilitation of injuries. All topics will highlight the osteopathic approach to evaluation and management. We will also look at opportunities to engage populations and institutions that are underserved by Sports Medicine professionals. 




